CURRIMUNDI COMMUNITY CLEANS UP

Vapes appeared in local Clean Up Australia Day (CUAD) rubbish collections for the first time this year.

These e-cigarettes were among the items removed from our environment by an awesome band of volunteer helpers at two main CUAD events in our local community, along with car tyres, a mattress, plastic milk crates, pieces of iron, a child's scooter and stacks of Slurpee cups.

"Thank you to the 22 volunteers who joined Currimundi Catchment Care Group's event at Stockyard Park, Little Mountain," Group President Tony Moorhead said. "It was wonderful to see several family groups from previous years return.

Main items collected: 1 bin full of soft plastics and 1 bin full of paper rubbish, 40 plastic bottles, 48 cans, 26 bottles, 60 Slurpee cups and lids, 90 paper straws and a few plastic ones, 20 plastic milk crates, 1 crate full of broken Styrofoam, 1 child's scooter, 4 car tyres and more general rubbish.

The Friends of Currimundi Lake CUAD event was held at Cliff Hargreaves Park on Sunday March 5. Volunteers scoured the beach, lake and surrounds for any litter, which was then sorted, bagged and binned.

"It was encouraging to note that the volume of rubbish was guite reduced due to the ongoing efforts of locals," Graham Smith said.

"This is the eighth year we have held the event at the same location, so it has been interesting to observe changes over the years. The volume of litter collected has decreased a little, but the most noticeable change has been the items we find.

"The container refund scheme has certainly done a good job reducing the number of bottles and cans, although there are still plenty. But other items are beginning to take their place - Slurpee drink containers and various coffee cups, lids and straws and takeaway food containers have been stand-outs for the last few years."

"The morning concluded with a convivial lunch provided by Debbie at Coco's. We thank the willing workers for their participation and a special thanks to Rhondda, Irene, Anne, Bill and Peter." More CUAD photos over page.



NOTICED THE SAND DREDGING?

Sand movement, whether natural or assisted, is always a topic of great interest for people who use Currimundi Lake for recreation. Sometimes they feel their favourite beach has been washed away or their favourite swimming area has been filled with sand. And they can get quite cranky when they see Council's earth-moving equipment shifting sand around.

People living in the catchment may have noticed that recently Council has begun a dredging



campaign upstream of the sand plug. The aim of this is to replenish beaches along the lake that have eroded during heavy rainfall.

The picture (right) illustrates dredging that occurred in February, near Cooper St. If this was your favourite beach that was washed away, it's now back for you to enjoy.

Currimundi Lake is an ICOLL (Intermittently Closing and Opening Lake or Lagoon) and experiences vast movement of sand in response to natural weather events such as storms and tidal surges. In view of the large built-up areas in the vicinity of the lake, there are several occasions where Council intervenes to ensure the safety of the system.

The primary tool used by Council to maintain the entrance to the lake on the northern end is a large sand berm at the lake mouth. This protects the extensive built environment on the southern side, including roads, parks and buildings. From time to time the berm has to be reconstructed by moving sand from other areas using large earth-moving machinery.

When the lake closes naturally to the ocean, the water level is monitored to ensure safety. Currimundi Lake is connected to Lake Kawana via the Wurtulla canal system. It receives inflows each day via the mechanical pumping system at the northern tip of Lake Kawana, and when the system is closed there is the possibility of the water level flowing over the revetment walls upstream.

If there is either a risk of flooding or for the lake to be impacted by water quality issues, the lake is manually opened to the ocean. *Information provided by Sunshine Coast Council.*
