There will be a great selection of food stalls, as well as local environmental displays and information in the TurtleCare marquee and Council's Discovery Van. Santa will make an appearance, arriving by boat across the lake.

The festival highlight is the parade of decorated watercraft, paddling around Currimundi Lake at dusk.

Currimundi Catchment Care Group (CCCG) recently teamed up with Sunshine Coast Council's BushCare team to coordinate two community planting events at Honey Farm Road Environmental Reserve.

Council staff had prepared the site with a generous layer of mulch to give the new plants the best chance to thrive and provided all the native plants and equipment for the day.

The first event involved around 200 participants from the International Geo-Caching Festival, held on the Sunshine Coast, Together, they planted 1000

Caching Festival, held on the Sunshine Coast. Together, they planted 1000 native trees, shrubs and grasses in the southern section of the reserve. A second session followed, with about 50 local community volunteers adding another 700 plants to the growing habitat.

It's inspiring to see how well previous plantings are already flourishing. We look forward to watching this new area mature in the years ahead.

A big thank you to all the volunteer planters, Council staff and CCCG members who made the morning such a fun and successful event.



2026 CALENDAR: WHAT A LITTLE BEAUTY

We have always known there is a huge diversity of people who love our catchment and often take photographs to remind themselves of its beauty. This year we can report that the youngest winner of the Currimundi Catchment Calendar photographic competition was only 11 years old and the oldest winner was 84!

Our 11-year-old provided a beautiful photograph of a peaceful walking track along the shores of the lake, and our oldest competitor was up early to snap a lovely picture of a pelican on the lake at sunrise.

All our photographers show us something interesting about the catchment. This year's cover page features Graham Gillies' excellent photo of a glossy black cockatoo. This stunning bird is a regular visitor to the Katheen McArthur Conservation Park to feast on the seeds of casuarina trees. These visits are very important because the glossy black cockatoo is listed as 'vulnerable' in Queensland, owing to loss of habitat through land clearing.

A big thank you once again to all the photographers who sent in their photographs of all the things they love and enjoy about the Currimundi Catchment. It's a wonderful place to live and, thanks to our talented photographers, we can enjoy these images all year.

FRIENDS OF CURRIMUNDI LAKE

The warm weather has dried off the lawns but has given life to many baby animals and plants in flower. Some of you will know my garden, so I have had visitors for constant fresh water, nectar from flowers and tree shade.

I think there are two pythons, blue tongue lizards, skinks, magpies, butcher birds, mickies, blueeyed honey eaters, rainbow lorikeets, turkeys, white ibis and baby plovers on the footpath plus the frogs are looking for water. The possums have started to investigate for fresh fruit. The weeds have exploded and are setting seed which means more weeds to keep our BushCare people busy.

It is also time for our marine turtles to start visiting our beaches. From 1 November, TurtleCare volunteers started their daily walks at 4.30am on our beaches. If you see a turtle or tracks, please ring 0488 719 579. Be aware of littering as this can end up in the ocean and affect our ocean life, including our turtles.

Our next FOCL meeting is on 2 December at 7.30pm at the Currimundi Community Hall. If you are interested in the environment and Currimundi, you are very welcome to attend. Have a great Christmas everyone, drive safely, swim between the flags and put your litter in the bins.

BEING WILD IS THIRSTY WORK

With the warmer months now here, you might consider putting out some water to give our native animals a hydrating helping hand, like the goanna pictured.

- Put containers of water around your yard, ideally in the shade and with some sticks or stones placed inside to act as a ramp for smaller animals.
- Keep the containers clean and try to change the water daily.
- Containers of different depths provide water for a range of different birds and animals.
- Try to place containers at different heights and locations, including under bushes or tree cover.
